The Three R's of a Post-Pandemic-People*

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"Reclaim-Rebuild-Recreate" – These were the three "R's" of last November's Synod-wide youth gathering at Mulhurst Lutheran Camp at Pidgeon Lake. Our three confirmands spent a weekend with about fifty other young people worshiping, playing, and learning what it means to reclaim who they are as children of God, to rebuild relationships with one another, and to recreate in body and spirit. It was the first youth gathering since the year 2019! With the leadership of Lizzy DeCorby, Glory and Mount Olivet youth are also practicing the three "R's" locally. More than 20 people gathered for an initial event of games and desert in January. Our confirmands come together every week to learn, play, and serve. Our children participate again in worship and Sunday School. Our 50+ group is holding events, our choir is singing, and council and committees are working in person again.

After three years of pandemic, we all need reclaiming, rebuilding and recreating. By coming together in worship and fellowship on Sundays, as well as week days during Lent, we reclaim who we are as the children of God. Like the aged wood of a fallen down barn on a prairie field, we are reclaimed by God and made into something new. What that something looks like is not quite clear yet, but since we are in the hands of the carpenter Son, Jesus Messiah, we know it will be beautiful. And it already is! It is beautiful to see so many of you return in person to worship. It is also beautiful to hear that many are making use of our new technological capabilities online. Through the work of our dedicated tech people we are rebuilding church in a "hybrid" fashion, strengthening our connections virtually. Our screens however must not prevent us from physical participation, even when distant. Jesus invites us to the Lord's Supper, Holy Communion, the central act of worship, reminding us that physical food and presence are recreating us as the Body of Christ.

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Another opportunity to reclaim, rebuild and recreate, is to join a small group. During the pandemic we shared our faith and our struggles with each other online in a small group discussion over ZOOM. Now the desire is to meet in person again. A group has begun gathering on Friday evening every second week in one participant's home. We share about our lives, we share God's Word in Scripture and discussion, we snack, we play, and we pray.


Lastly, I have committed to visiting you each in your homes. I want to hear what it's been like for you in the last few years, what your joys and your struggles are, what it means for you to reclaim, rebuild and recreate as a child of God. Some of you I have visited many times before, some only a few times, some once, others not yet at all. I want to see all of you in 2023! Over the next few months you will receive a phone call from the church to schedule a time for us to meet for an hour long visit. I do not expect you to prepare anything other than a place to sit, although I would accept a cup of coffee or tea or glass of water. At the end I would like to pray for you, your home, and your family. (If you are more comfortable meeting elsewhere, we can arrange another location, at the church, in a café, in a park, wherever you choose. My preference, however, is to meet you where you live.) Regular, unscheduled pastoral visits (e.g. at a time of illness or crisis) will of course continue during this time. Any time you would like

to talk, meet or pray you may call the church office or call me on my mobile phone.

In this new year, let us all join in God's work of reclaiming, rebuilding and recreating, with each other, for the world, and to the glory of God!

A Message from Pastor Nickel

OUR SPIRITUAL JOURNEY and the CHURCH YEAR:

Invitation: Let the EVENTS of the "CHURCH YEAR" GUIDE YOU to new understandings of God and His Love for us, and new experiences in our lives as we travel with God in our life. Millions have done so over the centuries...

So far with the help of the **Church Year**'s seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany [since 4 weeks before Christmas], we prepared for Jesus' birth, celebrated it, saw His early years, and experienced the start-up of His ministry including the gathering of disciples, teaching and healing.

Then, the later part of the Epiphany season brings us to see Jesus as his ministry grows, and then Epiphany ends February 19 [this year] with the Sunday of "The TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD".

The TRANSFIGURATION of Jesus:

+On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved son, echoing the words that were said at his baptism.

+The vision of God's glory is given to us and again and again he fulfills promises from the Old Testament about the coming of the Messiah, the Promised One of God -- the Son of God who would come to earth in human form.

+Matthew 17:1-9 take us there as Jesus is more fully revealed to Peter, James, and John.

Also, if you would like to look at the impact of that on his followers later on, take a look in 2 Peter 1:16-21. There the people of that time are pointed back to God and what God has done for them. So today, can <u>you</u> think of a way that God came to be with you in a new and meaningful way sometime in your life?

Looking to much earlier times in the Bible, you might remember Moses on Mount Sinai, in the Old Testament, when he experienced the presence of God. The "glory of the Lord" settled on the mountain and God spoke to Moses during that time. The two events are very similar experiences in which God has spoken to His People while involving "glory".

Think about "glory" for a moment.

+ Glory is something that belongs to God and is given or reflected in the world around us.

- + Glory can also change the normal and ordinary in our everyday lives as well, calling us to something that points us to God.
- + In the story of Jesus' transfiguration, perspectives are turned upside down: the past Old Testament prophecies are made real in Jesus' time. History is turned upside down as God's Son is revealed to be on earth because of God's love for us all.

That blew their minds, so-to-speak, **shifted their perspective**, **opened their eyes** to see a more loving God than they could ever imagine on their own.


They saw that God is directly at work in the world!


Human history is full of mountaintop experiences, vision quests, pilgrimages, and more which take us beyond ourselves toward God and His Way for us – Spiritual Journeys.

Any time, including now, is a good time to direct your life's journey toward God and His Love, toward God and His Guidance, toward God and the work of the Holy Spirit in your life. It is close as a prayer, your prayer – to God. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you in ways you need, and in ways you might not even guess could happen within you.

Bishop's Message - January 2022

Dear Beloved of God -

Imagine yourself as a witness to the crucifixion. How would you react? How would your life be impacted? What would it mean to you? How would you be changed?

In her book Witness at the Cross, scholar and teacher, Amy-Jill Levine, examines how the people at the cross each have distinct roles to play in the



Gospels. For each, Jesus has a particular meaning and personal message, shaped by their background, social context, and their role in the crucifixion and the events leading up to Jesus' death. From each of them, we learn how those meanings and messages cross the centuries to any who would come to the cross today.

What do the derisive words of the bystanders, the political leaders, the chief priests and scribes show us about the nature of blasphemy, and how does their presence force us to confront our own complicity: Can bystanders be innocent?

How are our views of criminal justice today challenged by our understanding of Rome's judicial system, which resulted in the deaths of the two crucified with Jesus and of Jesus himself? How does this knowledge inspire us to live as good neighbours to all?

The Roman soldiers: to what extent does their complicity and apparent indifference to Jesus' death indict us? What is the message to us as we go about our own business while innocents suffer and die?

What can we learn from the Beloved Disciple about Jesus' "new command" to love each other? Does this anonymous figure have anything to teach us about observing all time as sacred time?

What do the roles of the women at the cross (patrons, followers, supporters) reveal about the role of women in the church today? What roles can men and women play in bearing witness to God and Jesus in powerful ways?

How did Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus relate to Jesus before his death? How do their actions after his death provide a model for modern "sympathizers" of Jesus?

I invite you to explore these and other questions with me, to come to the cross.

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During the 6 weeks of Lent, leading to Holy Week and ultimately to Holy Friday and the looming shadow of the cross, I invite you to participate with me in a Bible study, offered online to lay and rostered members across the synod. Gather as community, as family, as witnesses at the cross, for a weekly ZOOM meeting, where we will read, view, ponder, discuss, and pray together. Be ready to tackle some hard questions as modern witnesses "at the Cross".

Walk with me and other siblings in Christ from across the synod, as we explore what it truly means to be a witness at the cross. Our journey begins on Shrove Tuesday (February 21) and continues to Holy Week, with meetings each Tuesday, at 9:00 am or 7:00 pm. We will spend 75 minutes together exploring Amy-Jill Levine's book Witness at the Cross: A beginner's guide to Holy Friday. I encourage you to gather as a small group in your church, as a community of neighbours, with friends in one another's homes, as family. What better way to build stronger relationships across the synod, than to ponder together such matters of faith? To explore together how being witnesses at the cross today continues to mold our lives as individuals, as members of church, as congregations, within our communities, in everything we do.



WITNESS at the CROSS: A Beginners Guide to Holy Friday

Synod-Wide Lenten Bible Study online each Tuesday in Lent beginning February 21, 2023 at 9 am or 7pm

A BEGINNER'S GUIDE to HOLY FRIDAY

WITNESS at the CROSS



Place yourself as a witness of the cross and determine what your own testimony will be!

Experience Holy Friday from the perspective of those who watched Jesus die: Mary his mother; the Beloved Disciple from the Gospel of John; Mary Magdalene and the other women from Galilee; the two men, usually identified as thieves, crucified with Jesus; the centurion and the soldiers; Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. Jews and Romans, friends and strangers, the powerful and the powerless, the hopeful and the despairing.

The story of Jesus's death is not something we just read: we think about it, and we experience it; we hear the taunts of the soldiers, the priests, and the passersby even as we hear the famous "seven last words" from the cross.

In Witness at the Cross, Amy-Jill Levine shows how the people at the cross each have distinct roles to play. Each Evangelist presents a distinct picture of the death of Jesus. Each portrays different individuals and groups of people at the cross, each offers different images and dialogues, and so from each, we learn how those meanings and messages cross the centuries to any who would come to the cross today.

Each Gospel has its own story to tell, all the witnesses have their own memories, and every reader comes away with a new insight. Join us for six 75-minute sessions to meet and learn from those who were witnesses at the cross.
