Message from Pastor Markus

June/July 2023

Dear Friends,

I have been asked several times during my home visits how I think the church, and our congregation in particular, is doing. Behind the question I often sensed a feeling of unease, or even of fear, that things are not as they should be, or as they once were, or as we'd like them to be. After three years of pandemic pandemonium, periodically locked church doors, and continual "hybrid worship", it's no wonder that things are not the same. Every sector of society and every place of work and worship, learning and service has experienced tremendous change, stress, innovations, and in some cases atrophy. You have all been part of the change.

Some of the change is difficult to accept. Some long time members and contributors, siblings in faith and companions on our faith journey are no longer with us. Some have died, others have moved, some have joined different congregations, others have moved to a different community, some have gotten used to worshiping online, others have gotten used to not worshiping altogether. We grieve these lost relationships. We ask God to give us courage to reach out where we can, to help us accept what we cannot change, and for wisdom as we move on.

Some of the change is wonderful and reason to celebrate. New worshipers have joined us, siblings in Christ who found their faith sustained or renewed through our online presence during the pandemic. Some are attending in person now. Some are participating in music and other forms of leadership. Some are being baptized or confirmed or both. Some are taking up new causes of ministry. I am personally touched by the faith and love that I have sensed in the new relationships that are forming within our congregation.

Some of the changes have been very tangible. For instance, the purchase of the property from the ELCIC, for which we fundraised during the first year of the pandemic. Then the Memorial Garden project, which we also fundraised for and which is now at the point where we can make us of it. What a project! Read more about it in this newsletter. The community garden has found a new site. The beavers have built new dams and the herons have built new nests. Everything is in flux and life continues to thrive.

We are blessed with an energetic young youth worker, Elizabeth DeCorby, who organized a number of events during her first few months with us. We have a

small but energetic group of kids who come up for children's time in worship and who love it when there is Sunday School. We have parents who are teaching the children creatively and faithfully about the love of God.

Do I have to mention our 50 Plus group who visited the mosque Masjid in the Park recently and learned how people of another Abrahamic faith worship and practice their faith? Do I have to mention the small groups that have been meeting bi-weekly to read a book and encourage one another in faith? Is there a need to mention that we were approached by the Solar Power Investment Cooperative of Edmonton to see whether we'd be interested in letting them install panels on our roof and reap the benefits of free electricity and a reduced carbon footprint?

Sometimes we have to remind ourselves how blessed we are. We have many reasons to give thanks, to go forward in mission with hope and courage during this era of change and uncertainty.

At Sunday worship over the past few weeks we've been reading stories from the book of Genesis about Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, Jacob and Rachel, the patriarchs and matriarchs of faith. As these men and women left the old behind and stretched towards the new at God's command, may they inspire us to do the same. As they disregarded their old age in order to welcome a newborn, as they gave up their comforts and security for the fragile but reliable and precious promises of God, as they savvily followed God's leading against the draw of tradition, as they wrestled with God for the blessing that was promised, may we become younger ourselves as we get older, may we sacrifice what we think we own in order to receive what God wants us to have, may we hold to the promise of life and wrest a blessing from God without breaking our own fragile promises. May we fulfill the mission God gave to his people through Abraham and Sarah: to be a blessing to all nations and families of the earth.

As you will read elsewhere in this newsletter, I will be part of our synodical delegation to Colombia. This journey of hope in the midst of challenges is one way we can reach beyond our own church community and synod to strengthen our relationship with people in the global south. I thank you for your prayers as we travel. I trust that you and I will be blessed, even as we bless the people we encounter during these summer days and these changing times.



Our **Spiritual**Journey

A Message from Pastor Nickel

-- Part 2, on "Fear"

Yes – there's a lot of FEAR in the world now; we encounter it at time when we are on our spiritual journey.

Today, do we have more reasons to be fear-ful? No; instead there are a lot of people manufacturing "fear", and using social media to stir up more fear than in the past.

Why? – fear "sells", makes money for a lot of people, persuades/redirects, and is one of the strongest motivators to influence you "for" or "against" something, or someone. A couple of studies I have seen tell that over 1/3 of all people are more easily influenced/motivated by fear than other factors.

For our Spiritual Journey of life, look INSTEAD to:

- + "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?"; and
- + "The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"; and
- + "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself".

Fearful? Pray to God for help with fear -- that the Holy Spirit will help us.

- + We have the reminder, "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son."
- + We have Jesus' message of: "Peace be unto/with you."
- + Jesus said that we should take his message of love with us, and also that he would be with us in our journey of life [no fear there].
- + He loves us now and invites us to love others, to forgive and be forgiven, and to have mercy, and more -- and that does help us overcome fear.

How about, fear of "death"? The message of Easter reminds us that no matter what happens to us, the Father will not let defeat and death be, "the end" – He will raise us up just as he raised up Jesus. "Because He lives, we shall also live." We need NOT fear death any longer

Fearful of your message and mission: to spread the good news of God's love to our neighbor, the stranger, the homeless, the alienated, the hungry and the thirsty, and the fearful and the angry? Do it with the help of the Holy Spirit! Then you are not alone and do not need to fear doing it.

Interested in sharing your faith? We are told to, "Go and tell", because "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." God will help you do it.

all the time, such as: fear of being left behind, or left out -- if you do not buy "their" product, idea, or deal!

Did you notice recently, a tv "personality"/commentator was fired from his multimillion dollar job for emails that showed that what he said on air was not what he believed, but rather, his program was shaped to keep his audience and his multi-million dollar salary and prestige. Another packaged his own white supremacy beliefs within the most popular political comments to make them "sell". And, across the border, sales figures show that fear sells guns, and a few gun companies hire people to promote that fear in order to sell.

This last year, there has been talk of whether there is more racism in North America and the world, or not. My look at recent investigative studies by those who track these concerns over decades, show that there IS an increase of racism against Jews, people of another skin colour, and of being other-than-you -are. It's mostly because of an increase by those who communicate that message wrapped up in fear on social media and tv.

Ok, we have problems in Canada, and we can do our part to help. During two recent weeks in Canada we had: an Anti-Bullying Day, Red Dress Day for missing/murdered indigenous women, and Caring for the Earth Day to help focus our worries about our earth. "Days" like that encourage us to think about these concerns and what you can do, as well as to ignore the "fear" factors that often swirls around them.

Food for thought:

- + Jesus tied murder and anger together and spoke against anger [in Matt.].
- + Jesus did not use fear or anger to harm another person nor sanction violence against any person. Instead he spoke against violence, warned about the dangers of fear and anger, and admonished his followers when they were inclined to harm others.

What place does fear have in your life as you go on your Spiritual Journey? Pray for the Holy Spirit's help. Want to talk about it? We're available... May the Peace of God ...be with you, Gary

PS: "Fear", versus "Afraid"

- Fear is an emotion experienced when encountered with a threat. Afraid is the feeling of fear.
- Afraid can also be used to express regret, concern or to express reluctance.
- Fear cannot be used to express these feelings.
- Fear tends to trigger extreme reactions in the individual experiencing the emotion. Being afraid does not always trigger extreme reactions.
- Afraid is a word that sprouts from the word fear.

Memorial Garden Dedication Service - June 25, 2023 Luther Rose Memorial Garden Project Summary - Rita Spain

It was not long after we moved into our new church home here at Glory, that congregation members first brought up the idea of a memorial garden. The notion resurfaced over the years and in March 2019, Brett Woodrow, Gaylene Sitler-Ard, Irmgard Lindquist, Nick Ronsko, Tim Kihn and I, had our first meeting as the Landscape and Memorial Garden committee.

Our beloved Irmgard passed away a year and a half later. She was a staunch supporter of a memorial garden and I believe she would be pleased with what has been accomplished here.

The committee's first task was to design a Landscape Master Plan for our beautiful property - a plan that was to include an area for a memorial garden. The Master Plan was completed by the end of 2019 and then our focus turned to developing the memorial garden.

The Luther Rose, a symbol of our Lutheran faith, was the inspiration for the garden. The circular design, the center cross, and the red and white roses are elements of the Luther Rose. Dora Berry, of Nature's Elements, was hired in 2020 to design a plan for the garden. She understood our vision for the Luther Rose Garden and was a joy to work with. Even though our meetings with Dora involved ZOOM, telephone calls, social distancing and masks, the design plan was finalised towards the end of 2020.



During the following year, the plan was presented to the congregation and the Stewardship Committee kicked off the fundraising event.

In 2022, Three Seasons Landscaping was hired to develop the garden and on June 13 of last year machinery was brought to the site and construction began! A few days of rain slightly delayed work but the last shrubs were planted on July 29, 2022. I admit that I shed a few joyful tears when I was told that the last shrub was planted. Around you are 34 trees, 77 Shrubs, and 23 rose bushes.



Two grant applications were submitted to Strathcona County and we are very grateful that these applications were approved. The grant money from the first application was used for benches, which were installed seven weeks ago, and the funds from the second grant application went towards the beautiful fir cross, which was installed just two weeks ago.

Trellises for the memorial plaques will be installed later this summer.

This, dear Glory family, is the Luther Rose Garden! To God be the Glory!





Bishop's Message - June 2023

Dear Beloved of God -

Plans are well underway for our Synod's journey to The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO), our Companion Synod Partner, from July 24-August 3.

Twelve participants will experience, embrace and engage in "Daunting Challenges – Wellsprings of Hope" through the varied contexts and



ministries of IELCO and of the Lutheran World Federation World Service office, through relationships formed and deepened with our siblings in Christ, and through many opportunities for learning and listening, for discovery and community.

It has been a gift and transforming experience for me to journey with, and to facilitate these journeys, with youth and adults from our Synod since 2009.

During our 2011 journey to Colombia, Rev. Eduardo Martinez, Bishop at that time, was asked to share his thoughts regarding the value of mission experiences such as ours, which focus on the building of relationships – for Synod participants, and for the people, congregations, missions and ministries of IELCO. He responded:

- this mission journey enables the participants to experience the context of ministry,
- this mission journey strengthens relationships we are able then to pray specifically and to share one another's story,
- this mission journey encourages individuals, congregations, missions and ministries of IELCO through listening, learning and affirmation,
- this mission journey enables each to experience similarities and differences, yet we are all the same,
- this mission journey enables the members, congregations and ministries of IELCO to know that they are not alone; instead, they are a part of a large family around the world,
- this mission journey encourages all to see different ways of living the faith –
 of being Christian in daily life in different ministry contexts, and
- this mission journey affirms the history of missions and missionaries in Colombia from Alberta.

I scrambled to write these words in my journal that day.

Today these words strike me in a new, different and fresh way as I consider my own ministry context. As lay and rostered leaders, as congregations, as Synod, as the ELCIC, we journey together in mission learning of one another's contexts for ministry. Relationships are strengthened and we are able to pray for another with specificity and share one another's stories. Ministries are encouraged through listening, learning and affirmation. We journey in mission together experiencing similarities and differences, yet we are the same. We discover that we are not alone but part of a family – a congregation, a Synod, the ELCIC, IELCO, the Lutheran World Federation, the Anglican Church of Canada, the Moravian Church, and so on. We journey together in mission seeing a multitude of ways of daily living the faith in various ministry contexts, and we affirm our history and experience of being in mission together.

Would you pray for our Synod delegation and for the IELCO family as together we experience, embrace and engage in "Daunting Challenges – Wellsprings of Hope.
